




## **ELDERS' CORNER:**

My name is Petula Gale Neegan (Achneepineskum), I am from Constance Lake First Nation. My husband is Neil Neegan and I have two children Abigail, 6 and Andrew, 5. I am the oldest sibling out of four brothers Jonah, Shawn, Gordie & Jamie. My parents are the late Colin and Deborah Achneepineskum. My late dad is originally from Marten Falls (Ogoki). I was born and raised in Hearst, Ontario.

I graduated the Personal Support Worker Program in 2007, post-secondary (2013), and the Early Childhood

Education Program in 2017.

During my younger years I worked in the education field, then in the PSW field for five years from 2008-2014 and enjoyed it so much. My elders taught me how to cook traditional foods, and how to tell legends and stories. In 2018 I decided I wanted more of a challenge in my career so I decided to apply for a job in my



local community Child Welfare agency Kunuwanimano Child and Family Services as their Family Support Worker. I really enjoyed it so much, getting to know my families and just being part of their daily lives in just one short year.

In March 2019, my family and I moved to Thunder Bay to further our careers. My husband is a water hub operator for all Matawa First Nation, and I continued to work in child welfare agencies. I look forward to working with Rocky Bay Child and Family Services.
